THE REBIRTH OF A PEEKSKILL LANDMARK

(Peekskill, New York)... Mayor John G. Testa and members of the Common Council will join Richard and Katharina Cerreta in celebrating the one anniversary of the reemergence of the Standard House as a key landmark in Peekskill's riverfront at a ribbon cutting ceremony on Thursday, September 19, 2002 at 5:00 pm at 50 Hudson Street.

As residents of Peekskill, Richard and Katharina Cerreta have always been active members of their community. In 1998 when an opportunity presented itself for the Cerretas to take a more prominent role in historic restoration, they bought the Standard House. This landmark was part of the commercial hub of business activity in Peekskill from the 1850s until 1920, when the Carbone family purchased it as investment property. With the use of historic tax credits, the Cerretas were able to complete the extensive renovations proposed for the building as well as restore it to prominence as one of the premier building on the riverfront in Peekskill. The Cerretas have fully leased the building and name Talk Cinema, Panoply on Park and Metro among their tenants.

"We are proud of the accomplishment we were able to achieve in connection with the Standard House. We've received tremendous support from the Peekskill community who've shared our dream of redeveloping this prominent landmark in Peekskill. We are also fortunate that we were able to lease the building to quality tenants who support our efforts in ensuring that the building remains in its current condition. It was a true labor of love," remarked Richard and Katharina Cerreta.
